



BASIC INFORMATION

Be sure to read the rules of the Department and or Division you are entering, as well as the General Rules.

RULES AND REGULATIONS

ENTRIES

- 1. Competition is open to Weber County residents only, unless otherwise stipulated in department rules.
- 2. Competition at the Weber County Fair is governed by rules in each department.
- 3. Entry blanks, completed and properly filled in, must be submitted in all departments on or before the deadline specified. Mail to Weber County Fair, 1000 North 1200 West, Ogden, Utah 84404. Exhibits will not be accepted if entry blanks have not been postmarked by deadline.
- 4. All entries must be made upon entry blanks furnished by the Weber County Fair and by the rules listed in each department. The entry fee is to accompany each entry blank. No refunds will be given on entry fees.
- 5. Unless otherwise provided, animals or articles can be entered only by their owner or producer. Any attempt to perpetrate a fraud by misrepresentation will bar the specimen from competing for any premium. Department Superintendents may remove from the grounds any exhibit that is falsely entered or which may be deemed unsuitable or objectionable.
- Any article eligible to enter, not enumerated in the premium list, will be entered in its appropriate class but no premium shall be awarded, unless by special action of the Board.
- 7. If it is necessary for an exhibitor to send an exhibit by freight or express, it must be sent prepaid and no signature required, to the Weber County Fair, 1000 North 1200 West, Ogden, UT 84404.

PREMIUMS

All prizes will be awarded at the earliest possible time after judging. Premium cash will be distributed during the Fair Wednesday through Saturday 11:00 am - 11:00 pm at the premium bank located in the Northwest corner of the Golden Spike Arena. Premium money may be collected from 9:00 am - 5:00 pm, Monday - Friday after the Fair until August 31, 2005. Money not collected by August 31, 2005 will be forfeited. NO EXCEPTIONS! Picture i.d. of exhibitor is required. If picture i.d. is not available, the exhibitor's guardian will be required to collect premium money.

JUDGING

- 1. No judge will be allowed to exhibit in the department in which he/she is acting as a judge.
- 2. A judge should not be allowed to judge exhibits entered by a member of his or her immediate family. The judge should notify the Department Superintendent prior to judging if this situation occurs.
- 3. Judges must avoid contact with the exhibitors and will refuse to hear the merits or demerits of exhibits by anyone. They must, if an attempt be made by an exhibitor to interfere or influence their decision, report the fact at once to the Department Superintendent.

- 4. The regular premium offered by the Fair cannot be changed by any judge or superintendent, and no extra premiums can be awarded except by the Board. In the event that there is no competition in class or category (two entries made by the same person do not constitute competition), the judge shall determine what classification would be appropriate for the entry in the face of the competition, prize money to be awarded, and ribbon to be awarded. In no event will two entries by the same owner, producer, or same herd constitute competition, if these are all the items in the class for which cash premiums are offered.
- 5. Judges must not award prizes to an unworthy exhibit. It is the intention of the management that no premium or distinction of any kind shall be given to any animal or article that is not deserving. This rule must be strictly adhered to whether or not there is competition.
- 6. The judges and persons acting as clerks to the judges must use special care, after the award has been made, to see that the name is properly entered in the record book and on the premium voucher, for it is upon this entry that the payment of premium is made.
- 7. The judge, superintendent or clerk, recording the awards of the department, must sign the record book and premium voucher at the close of each class immediately after all awards in said class have been made.
- 8. The entry clerks shall under no circumstances allow the award records to go from their possession, or to be inspected by anyone, except authorized officers until entries of the judges' decisions have been made, the records audited and closed.
- 9. The judge should read carefully the general rules and all special rules under the heading of the department or class in which they are to serve; and especially note and mark those rules bearing on the classes to be adjudicated by them. Ignorance of rules is inexcusable with a judge.
- 10. Objection to any person serving as judge must be made to the Fair Manager in writing prior to any award made, giving good and sufficient reason thereof.
- 11. If a protest or grievance is made, it should be made in writing to the Fair Manager along with a \$50.00 cash deposit. It will then be taken to the Board for a ruling. If the protest or grievance is not sustained, the deposit will be forfeited.
- 12. If it be ascertained that any exhibitor has, in an ungentle-manly manner, taken exception to the judgement or ruling of a judge, employee or any official of the Weber County Fair, the Board can bar the said person from competing for a premium or exhibiting on the grounds until he has made proper apology and is reinstated by the Board.

CONCESSIONS (Food, Game, Midway) and COMMERCIAL EXHIBITORS

- Under no circumstance will privileges of a questionable nature or a demoralizing tendency be sold or in any manner tolerated on the grounds or in the buildings. No noiseproducing toys, confetti, return balls, ticklers and the like will be offered for sale. In fact, all games contrary to the law are positively forbidden.
- 2. The Board reserves the right to remove from the grounds any sign, banner, or advertising matter of any kind which

- may be unsuitable or objectionable without assigning reasons thereof.
- 3. Concessionaire must comply with state, county and city food and health requirements. All deliveries of supplies must be made one hour before Fair opens.
- 4. The booth, stand or tent, erected by the concessionaire must be of such a nature as to meet the approval of the Food and Beverage Manager.
- 5. Any special electrical wiring or connections to utilities will need prior approval of the Fair maintenance.
- 6. Any approved changes will be done by the Exhibitor or Concessionaire at no cost to the Fair. The Exhibitor or Concessionaire must restore the building to original form before vacating.

GENERAL PUBLIC

- 1. Management reserves the right to remove from the grounds any person or persons distributing advertising material, political flyers or conducting private business who does not have an authorized space lease agreement.
- 2. Any member of the visiting public who feels they have been mistreated by fair personnel, exhibitors, midway or food concession personnel, or others shall submit, in writing, a detailed summary of their complaint for action by the Fair Management and Weber County Fair Board.
- Any member of the visiting public involved in any type of accident while on the fairgrounds shall contact the Fair Administration Office and request that a Security Officer complete an official accident report.
- 4. No dogs, bicycles, scooters, roller blades, motor-cycles, or non-approved golf carts will be allowed on the fairgrounds without written approval of the Fair Management.
- 5. Any member of the visiting public purchasing merchandise or entering into contracts with commercial, education or non-profit exhibitors is responsible for his own transactions. The Weber County Fair or its Board of Directors will not assume responsibility for faulty merchandise or for agreements entered into by a patron.
- 6. Patrons should not deface the grounds, buildings, tents or exhibitor booths.
- 7. No fires or flammable materials are allowed on the fair-grounds without approval from Fire Marshall.
- 8. Patrons shall not remove Weber County property from the buildings and grounds.
- 9. No carry-in coolers will be allowed.
- 10. No smoking in buildings.

LIABILITY OF EXHIBITORS / GENERAL PUBLIC

In no case shall the Weber County Fair or any of its officers be held responsible for damages in any loss, damage, injury, death, or disability by disease or from theft or from any other cause to any such property, or to any person at the Weber County Fairgrounds. The Weber County Fair hereby does not assume any responsibility for the safety of any property brought upon the Weber County Fairgrounds. While the Fair personnel will exercise all reasonable precautions, any property displayed is done at the owner's risk.

The Fair management reserves the right to exclude from

the grounds any person or persons whom they deem undesirable, or expel from the grounds such person or persons who shall violate any of the general or special department rules.

Those associated with a exhibit are not allowed to have alcohol beverages in their exhibit area.

- 3. Decorations in booth should be of fire-resistant or non-flammable materials. (Call local fire department on how to make items fire resistant or non-flammable).
- 4. A tarp or covering, that will protect against discoloration, should be used if using material on the floor.
- 5. Each booth space will be 8' across the front, 8' deep; and 8' tall. It is a pipe and drape frame. No other booth supplies will be provided. Do not plan to use drape for hanging things.
- 6. Signs will be provided for each participating community booth. If you want to use your own sign, please indicate that at time of signing up.
- 7. Booth set up: Monday, August 8, 2005 between 7:00 pm and 9:00 pm NO EXCEPTIONS!! Booth space will be given out on a first come, first serve basis.

- 2. Exhibits must have been completed in the current 4-H year (Oct.2004-Sept.2005).
- 3. To exhibit for premium monies 4-H members must have been in the 3rd 12th grade as of Jan. 1 of current year.
- 4. Cloverbuds (Kindergarten 2nd grade as of Jan. 1 of current year) are not eligible for premium monies but are encouraged to exhibit.
- 5. Exhibitors must PRE-ENTER! 4-H Indoor Exhibit Entry Forms are due on or before July 29, 2005. Forms are available at the USU Extension office and in the back of the Fair premium book.
- 6. 4-H grade classifications are:

Cloverbuds: K - 2nd grade
Juniors: 3rd - 5th grades
Intermediates: 6th - 8th grades
Seniors: 9th - 12th grades

- 7. Number of entries allowed per exhibitor:
 - A. If Lot #'s are listed under a Class, exhibitors may enter one item per Lot #.
 - B. If there are no Lot #'s listed under a Class exhibitors may only enter one item per Class.
 - C. Fruit/Vegetable exhibits are limited to five (5) entries.
 - D. The total # of 4-H Indoor Exhibit entries per 4-H member is limited to ten (10) entries (if you have more than 10 you have the option of exhibiting those in open-class).
- 8. Bringing exhibits to the fairgrounds including gardening and crops and pick up:

- 1. Show management will not be responsible for the loss of birds, however, the best security possible will be given.
- 2. The right is reserved to disqualify all unworthy specimens
- Substitutions will be permitted only when in same class, color, age, and sex.
- 4. No birds will be allowed into the showroom on which the entry fee has not been paid.
- 5. The Superintendent is the final authority to grant early release if he deems the case an emergency. He has the final say in all disputes and shall be the final word in all matters pertaining to the running of the showroom.
- No birds allowed out of the showroom without written permission of the Show Superintendent or their appointed assistant.
- 7. No Sale Birds will be allowed in the Show Room.
- 8. Only 15 birds allowed per exhibitor.
- 9. If you cannot abide by these rules, do not enter.
- 10. There will be no communication with the judge during or prior to judging. This will result in disqualification.

MISCELLANEOUS

BANDS: This show is conducted under rules that recognize all seamless bands or reputable banding organizations. 1990 birds must wear official bands of the proper size issued by any club organization, and may enter and compete on a fair basis for the premiums offered. All birds must wear some kind of regulation numbered band. Letters as well as numbers must be shown on a leg band. If split bands are used, birds will be classed as old birds.

JUDGING

DISQUALIFICATIONS: The right is reserved for judges

to disqualify all unworthy specimens. Each specimen must be bonafide property of the exhibitor and shown in its natural condition. Conversation with the judge is prohibited during judging, except with show management. A violation of this rule disqualifies the exhibitor's bird.

Reliable and competent judges have been selected by the Specialty clubs and the U.P.C. and their decision is final.
